
Newsletter – Education Project May 2012

FEEDING THE MINDS OF ZIMBABWE'S EVEN

Chinhoyi Primary School – 750 children

During 2011 we saw every child that was registered in the school given back the right to attend school without the threat of being sent home. You will remember from the film, Zimbabwe's Forgotten Children, the school had NOTHING – it was barren and surrounded by a depressed community – it lacked hope, and the sound of happy children!

Now – THANKS TO YOU – children flock to school every day laughing and eager to learn. They have all the necessary educational materials, a water source so they can drink clean water, a flourishing agricultural plot producing enough to supply HIV+ children and orphans with vegetables, and soon every child will receive a meal at school. The school itself has funded (with a small pot of money received through the UNICEF funded BEAM system) a new school block, and next term they will be starting a carpentry club to build their own desks and chairs. Grade zero and pre-school classes have been introduced and young children are no longer being kept at home to do chores rather than get the education they deserve.







It is important to note that we have worked in partnership with the children, and their parents to make this happen and all the training has created opportunities, which they have jumped on, to bring in their own income. It is their community and the children themselves who have put in all the hard work and effort to improve their lives, and we are delighted by their passion. The school fees allowance allocated for each child, has been stretched as far as possible with training workshops, extra-curricular activities and after school clubs so everyone who wants to, and is able to, can be a part of creating a centre of hope and future sustainability. From watering crops in the agriculture plot to building their own desks, our goal is that these children will not only leave this school with an academic education, but the wherewithal to build a healthy life without the need for aid.

In February 2012 we held a workshop on HIV/AIDS, health and child protection – attended by the parents and teachers in the health committee and child protection committee. Following this workshop, the committee members and school head arranged training for the older pupils who represent the children on the Child Protection committee. Through several weeks of creative drama, poems, presentations and role play the older children then showcased their talent and knowledge to all school children and guest speakers were drawn from the parents and teachers who attended the workshop. This has been a very successful project and encouraged the community to create systems in which sick or abused children can be given the help they need. It has also massively reduced absenteeism.





The Anglican Diocese Scholarship Fund – 16 children

After several meetings with the staff at the Manicaland Anglican Diocese we are continuing our support to the children within their scholarship program who are intellectually gifted but lack the financial means to realise their potential. During 2011 we sponsored 96 children who were on a waiting list to receive full time funding from corporate/banking companies within Zimbabwe. This funding has now been approved and those children have the financial commitment to see them through to the end of school. However a small number (16) were not successful in receiving this vital funding, so we are pleased to report that we have been able to step in and provide this commitment so they are able to continue thriving in their school environment. Most of these children have completed their junior school education and did extremely well so we felt it would be wasted potential not to allow them the opportunity to carry on into high school with the exceptional grades they had proudly achieved.

Project Batsirai in partnership with Astute Ltd

We are very pleased to report that thanks to the management and staff of Astute Ltd we have been able to expand further on our goal of getting more children back into school. We have chosen to work in a township just outside Harare whose children and families are living in dire poverty. Our Zim Project Manager has been working with volunteers to identify the worst cases of orphans and malnourished children who have been out of school for a while. Due to the scale of poverty we will not only be assisting with school fees, we will be working with the families to find ways of providing nutritious food and in some cases – healthcare. As the need is so urgent, food hampers will be supplied whilst we ascertain the best methods for the families and children to start creating their own income generating plans.

The staff at Astute Ltd do a very simple but effective fundraising activity every month – dress down Friday!
